Personal Management Merit Badge

The Personal Management Merit Badge is one of the 21 mandatory merit badges required to earn the rank of Eagle. It is one of the most challenging merit badges to earn requiring as much (if not more) independent work as classroom work. A total of 19 scouts signed up for this merit badge class earlier this Spring, which is quite a large group. In class, we have covered almost all of the requirements including: an exploration of emotions surrounding money; an examination of different types of investment and the difference between investing and saving; the concept of Return on Investment and risk; stock tracking; loans and interest rates; credit and debit cards; and credit reports and scores.

This merit badge also requires that each scout undertake four independent tasks: 1) analysis and planning for a family purchase; 2) preparation of a personal budget and income/expense tracking for three months; 3) preparation of a 7-day schedule and diary as a time management exercise; and preparation of a written project plan. We have gone over each of these in class and each are explained in some detail in the merit badge pamphlet and the worksheet.

We will spend the last two meetings before summer camp working on reviewing progress on all of the requirements and I will be signing off on the completion of individual requirements. I will also be available to anyone (Scout or parent) at anytime during the summer to answer questions or to review work (Dean.Gore.3323@gmail.com, and 713-498-5760). Please help your son out as much as you can. From my own experience, I know that his success with this merit badge will depend much upon your involvement and encouragement.



Coin Collecting Merit Badge

We started the coin collecting merit badge in April. We have learned about the US Mint,

Bureau of Engraving and Printing, different kinds of coin collections, how to determine the value of a coin, different ways to store a collection, names of all the famous individuals on paper currency, how to identify a mint mark, and also shared personal collections with the group. We completed the Merit Badge two weeks ago. We will still hold classes at the remaining June Troop meetings to help complete missing requirements.

Cycling Merit Badge Tracy Fowler, Counselor

In April a small group of older Scouts started work on the Cycling merit badge. "Classroom" requirements include first aid review, bike maintenance, and riding safety. In addition, the Cycling Merit Badge requires a total of 150 miles of bike riding! We've largely finished the classroom requirements, and are ready to begin the rides. The rides consist of two 10-mile rides. two 15-mile rides, two 25-mile rides, and one 50mile ride. We will schedule the rides throughout the summer, working around the end of school, campouts, summer camp, and other calendar events. Naturally, we will need a few adults who are willing to limber up their legs to help on the rides, or to volunteer to provide ride support (for refreshments or break downs).

The July FCE class is scheduled for Sunday, July 7th 2-4pm at NHLC as usual.

The August FCE class is usually held during the NHLC lock-in the first weekend of August. On Friday night we setup stations inside the gym to teach various requirements. FCE class runs 6-8pm with the lock-in starting at 8pm.
