


- Ensures that quality adult leadership is recruited and trained.
- Provides adequate meeting facilities.
- Advises the Scoutmaster on policies relating to Boy Scouting and the chartered organization.
- Supports leaders in carrying out the program.
- Is responsible for finances, adequate funds, and disbursements in line with the approved budget plan.

Troop Committee Functions (cont'd)

- Obtains, maintains, and properly cares for troop property.
- Ensures the troop has an outdoor program.
- Serves on Boards of Review.
- Supports the Scoutmaster in working with individual boys and problems that may affect the overall troop program.
- Provides for the special needs and assistance some boys may require.
- Helps with the Friends of Scouting campaign.
- Assists the Scoutmaster with handling boy behavioral problems.

Scout Accounts

- Each Scout has a 'theoretical' Sub-account
 - Credits
 - Annual Dues and camping fees paid
 - Fundraising income
 - Debits
 - Campout fees
 - Summer camp and / high adventure costs
 - Fundraising can be used to pay for semi-annual camping fees, summer camp, winter camp, high adventure camp
 - Funds raised are not payable if a scout drops out of the Scouting program, but can be transferred to another troop

Troop Fees

Annual Troop Dues

\$85 annually due on 2nd Tuesday of November

Annual Camping Fees

- \$15 / campout collected twice a year
- Fall camping fees \$75 due on 2nd Tuesday of September
- Spring camping fees \$75 due on 2nd Tuesday of January
- Balance rolls over if scout does not attend all campouts

Specific Campout Surcharge

 Cost varies depending on the campout and collected in advance of the specific campout for which the surcharge is applied.



Troop Fees

Long Term Camp Fees

- Cost varies depending on camp and location
- Typically \$250-\$500 for summer camp depending on transportation
- Typically \$200-\$300 for winter camp

High Adventure Fees

- Cost varies depending on camp and location
- For example, Philmont fee is \$740/person + transportation
- Can be as much as \$2,000 (Sea Base)

Refunds

Troop fees are refundable or transferrable to another Troop on a pro-rata basis.

Fundraising 1 of 2

Popcorn

- All sales over \$50 go to Scout account
- Sales under \$50 go to Troop account
- All parent sales go to Troop account

Garage Sale

- 60% of proceeds go to Scout account based upon hours worked
- 40% of proceeds go to Troop account

Car Wash, Entertainment books, Bass Pro Shops, Other

100% of proceeds go to Scout account



Fundraising 2 of 2

Scout fair coupon books

- 100% of proceeds go to Scout account
- Usually around \$3-\$4 / coupon book in proceeds to the Scout account

Randall's / Kroger

- Good neighbor / Community Rewards program proceeds go to Troop account
- Link your Randall's or Kroger card to Troop 1424

Pay down camping fees

 It is possible to pay annual camping fees and summer camp fees through active participation in fundraising activities

TRANSITION



Scoutmaster Corps

- Works directly with the Scouts to provide the program for the troop.
- Trains boy leaders by providing direction, coaching and support.
- ▶ Can be male or female, but must be at least 21 years of age.
- Is appointed by the head of the chartered organization.






Scoutmaster / Assistant Scoutmaster Responsibilities





- Obtains training for the Scoutmaster position.
- Works with other responsible adults to bring Scouting to boys.
- Uses the methods of Scouting to achieve the Aims of Scouting.

Youth Leadership 1 of 2



Troop Leaders

- Senior Patrol Leader (SPL)
- Assistant Senior Patrol Leader (ASPL)
- Must have achieved First Class Rank
- At least 13 years old
- Serve 6 months in position
- ASPL assumes duties of SPL after 6 months

Appointed Positions

- Quartermaster, Scribe, Librarian, Historian, Chaplain Aide, Instructor, OA Representative
- Appointed by SPL
- Serve 6 months in position
- Den Chief(s) appointed by the Scoutmaster



Youth Leadership 2 of 2

Patrols

- Patrol Leader and Assistant Patrol Leader in each Patrol
- Patrol Leaders should be at least 13 years old
- Patrol Leaders should be at least First Class rank
- Elected every 6 months

Other

- Junior Assistant Scoutmaster
- Eagle rank but not yet 18 years old



Training for Youth

- Introduction to Leadership Skills Troop (ILST)
 - Delivered twice yearly by the Troop to Youth in a Leadership position
 - Ideally held right after elections for maximum effectiveness for newly elected / appointed leaders.
 - Training is organized by SM, ASMs, and SPL.
- National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT)
 - Delivered in December and June by the Council
 - Scout participation is voluntary and is by nomination of the SM
- National Advanced Youth Leadership Experience (NAYLE)
 - Delivered during Summer at Philmont
 - Only ILST & NYLT graduates and by nomination of SM

- Lock-in before School starts in August

Requirements to attend a Campout

Scouts

- Be a registered member of the Troop
- Invited Guest that is a registered member of another Troop
- Submit medical forms appropriate for campout duration

Adults

- Current Youth Protection Training (YPT) is required
- Registered member of Troop is strongly encouraged
- Submit medical forms appropriate for campout duration
- Current Tetanus shot (within last 10 years)
- Familiar with <u>Guide to Safe Scouting</u>

Webelos II

Invited on select campouts and must be with Parent or Guardian.



Scout Conduct Requirements

- Follow the Scout Oath and Law
- Respect for all Adults and Scoutmasters
- No Bullying Pledge
- Totin chip required for knives and wood tools Firem'n chit required for matches and firebuilding
- Swim test required for certain activities
- Parental support is requested for Scout conduct requirements

General Prohibitions

- Guide to Safe Scouting
- Prohibited activities: paint ball, four wheelers, handguns, propane equipment in tents.
- Prohibited items: fireworks, personal firearms or archery equipment, fixed-blade knives, large folding knives, sling shots, air and air-soft guns, tobacco products, alcohol, tomahawks, liquid-fueled equipment, pornography
- ► Electronic games and phones generally are OK while traveling, but must be left in the vehicles

Scout Conduct Consequences

- Verbal Warning by an Adult/Scoutmaster
- Incidents investigated by two adults (two-deep leadership) unrelated to the scouts
- Serious incidents include the Scoutmaster and Committee Chair
- Loss of activity participation privileges (time-out)
- Loss of items (knives, matches, prohibited items)
- Call to parents
- Request of parents to pick-up their Scout
- Suspension from Troop activities
- Expulsion from the Troop



Advancement 1 of 4

- Rank Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life, Eagle
 - Scout rank is largely a repeat of Webelos AOL requirements
 - Tenderfoot, Second Class and First Class ranks are skill-based
 - Star, Life, and Eagle ranks require more advanced skills (merit badges) and leadership

Rank requirements

- Can be found in Boy Scout Handbook
- Accomplishment of each requirement will be recorded in Handbook
- Sign-off on requirements by Scoutmaster or Assistant Scoutmaster
- Scoutmaster Conference after all requirements are completed
- Board of Review (BOR) after Scoutmaster conference
- Recorded in *Troopmaster* and BSA Internet Advancement system after BOR and awarded at next Court of Honor



Advancement 2 of 4



- Advancement is individual, not as a group, den, or patrol
- Boys advance at their own pace, generally the harder they work the faster they advance
- Troop has structured First Class Emphasis (FCE) to help Scouts reach First Class rank within 12-18 months of joining the Troop



Advancement 3 of 4



Scoutmaster Conference

- Between Scout and Scoutmaster or ASM
- Requirement is to 'participate' in a Scoutmaster conference but it is also a good opportunity for the SM/ASM to discuss the rank requirements with the Scout
- Scout will need to request a Scoutmaster conference
- Class A Uniform and be prepared to discuss the rank requirements.
- Usually held at weekly Tuesday Troop meetings



Advancement 4 of 4



Board of Review


- Board comprised of 3 Adult members of the Troop
- Cannot include Parent / Guardian of Scout
- Does not include the Scoutmaster
- Class A Uniform (Shirt, pants, sash, socks, and all patches)
- Discuss achievements and discuss points of the Scout Law,
 Scout Oath, Scout Motto, Scout Slogan, and Outdoor Code.
- Sign-off in Scouts' handbook by all three Adult members of the BOR
- Rank achievement and dates recorded in *Troopmaster* and Internet advancement.



Merit Badges 1 of 8



- Roughly 120 Merit Badges currently offered by BSA
- Merit Badge books available at the Scout Shop
- Requirements and Workbooks available online at www.meritbadge.org
- Advancement App is available for Apple devices at App Store for \$2.99
- 13 of the Merit Badges are required to earn Eagle Scout rank or "Eagle-required" Merit Badges
- Swimming and First Aid are fundamental

Merit Badges 3 of 8





- Merit Badges are awarded by the troop
- Generally Four Methods to earn Merit Badges
 - Troop led merit badge courses.
 - Troop adults led the courses as counselors
 - Summer or Winter Camp
 - District or Council Events (TW Merit Badge Day)
 - Merit Badges taught by Others
 - Many Organizations in our area offer merit badge programs
 - Houston Museum of Natural Science, The Health Museum, Moody Gardens, Space Center Houston, Texas State Aquarium, Matagorda Bay Nature Center, Texas A&M Vet School, etc.

Merit Badges taught by Troop

- Group Signup for merit badge classes offered by Troop in Fall
 & Spring
- Individual Contact Merit Badge Counselor
- Prepare blue card
- Attend Merit badge classes
- Complete the requirements
- Sign-Off by Merit Badge counselor
- Review with SM and obtain sign-off as Unit Leader
- Turn-in blue card to Advancement Coordinator
- Keep Scout portion of Blue card

Merit Badges 5 of 8



Merit Badges at Summer / Winter Camp

- The Troop will prepare a signup roster for everyone attending Camp
- Scouts attend classes while at Camp
- Generally the Camp keeps the attendance and completion of requirements records and sends to the Troop after Camp
- If possible get a copy of the Camp records before leaving Camp
- Merit Badge list sent by the Camp is reviewed by the Troop and any missing requirements are checked with Scouts
- If necessary the Troop will contact the Camp about inaccuracies in the records
- If Scout would like the opportunity to complete the requirements the Troop may be able to provide a Counselor to complete the MB.
- Advancement Chair will enter records into *Troopmaster* and Internet Advancement.
- Receive Merit Badge at Court of Honor



Merit Badges 6 of 8

Merit Badges taught by District / Council

- Merit Badge days offered by District or Council
- Signup for merit badge classes offered by District or Council
- Normally we will register as a Troop
- Prepare blue card
- Attend Merit badge classes
- Complete the requirements
- Sign-Off by Merit Badge counselor
- Review with SM and obtain sign-off as Unit Leader
- Turn-in blue card to Advancement Chair
- Keep Scout portion of Blue card
- Receive Merit Badge at Court of Honor



Merit Badges 7 of 8



Merit Badges taught outside District or Troop Event

- Discuss the chosen MB class with SM in advance to get a "Blue Card" started for the MB signed by the SM.
- Signup for the Merit Badge class
- Prepare blue card
- Attend the MB Class
- Scout is responsible for obtaining all necessary approvals / signatures from the MB Counselor recorded on the Blue Card.
- Review the Blue Card with the SM after completing the class.
- Once the SM is satisfied that the requirements have been met then the Scout turns the Blue Card in to the Troop Advancement Chairman.

BOY SCOUT MERIT BADGES

By Air, Sea, and Rail (Aviation, Railroading, and Oceanography Merit Badges)

Oceans cover most of the planet, influencing the weather, the land, and the air - learn what's in the sea and on the ocean floor. Discover how a plane flies and how to plot your course. Take a trip downtown on Houston's light rail and go on a full-day excursion to Galveston to visit the Lone Star Flight Museum, the Railroad Museum, and the research headquarters for the Flower Garden Banks Marine Sanctuary. Earn all requirements for these 3 badges in a jam-packed week on the move!

 - Turn-in blue card to Advancement chair




